## Classical Japanese Literature

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This course will be taught in Michaelmas Term (8 lectures, 1 tutorial) and Hilary Term (7 seminars).

Lectures: MT Mondays 4-5pm.

Tutorials: time and place to be arranged with each student.

Seminar: HT weeks 1-7, Mondays 4-5pm.

Prerequisites: None.

## **Course description:**

This course provides a survey of texts and topics in Japanese literature from earliest times to the early nineteenth century, with readings in English translation from a wide range of primary sources as well as suggested secondary readings on key topics in the literature of each period. The course aims to give students an overview of key texts, authors, and genres in the pre-modern Japanese literary tradition, while also helping them develop critical tools for thinking about that tradition and for approaching literary texts in a variety of ways.

Students should attend the lecture series in Classical Japanese Literature (MT) and participate in the seminar series Topics in Classical Poetry (HT) for focused small-group discussion of selected poems of various periods along with key secondary resources and research methods. In the final seminar meeting, students will be offered the chance to present on their own research or a relevant source.

#### **Course Assessment:**

The main assessment will be through a three-hour examination in Trinity Term.

Students will be required to submit two essays on agreed topics (one by the end of MT week 4), each to be discussed in a tutorial/seminar meeting.
